A Part of Something Bigger



Although we generally just say "the Tawes Garden" for brevity, the full name of our site is the Helen Avalynne Tawes Garden **& Arboretum.** That's a bit of a mouthful for everyday use. Even Maryland's First Lady herself was known as "Lou" to her family. However, we periodically like to remind everyone that the Garden is indeed also an Arboretum, a Level II accredited collection of trees and shrubs.

The certification is provided by ArbNet, an organization headquartered at the Morton Arboretum near Chicago, IL, which describes itself as "an interactive, collaborative, international community of arboreta and tree-focused professionals. ArbNet facilitates the sharing of knowledge, experience, and other resources to help arboreta meet their institutional goals and works to raise professional standards through the ArbNet Arboretum Accreditation Program."



Founded in 2011, ArbNet has grown exponentially and now has hundreds of members all over the world. It serves as an information resource, networking channel, and a center for collaboration among arboreta large and small. Some of the sites gathered under the ArbNet umbrella are not dedicated arboreta, but rather organizations with widely differing purposes: churches, cemeteries, schools, urban parks, even residential developments, which have curated collections of trees they wish to protect and preserve. If they meet the certification requirements, membership in ArbNet gives them enhanced recognition as affiliates of a widely respected scientific institution.

The Tawes Garden & Arboretum was accredited in 2016 and will need to renew its accreditation in 2027. Recently, Park Service Manager Ranger Curtis Dale and the Friends of Tawes Garden realized that, owing mostly to personnel changes over the past few years, we no longer had a good grasp of our relationship with ArbNet and its work.

So, he arranged for DNR staff and the Board of the Friends to meet via Zoom with Sue Paist, ArbNet Coordinator, in March. In a very informative and enjoyable session she brought us up to date on ArbNet's purpose and work, its many resources, its opportunities for scientific collaboration, and much more that can be found on its website, <u>ArbNet.org</u>. Although the Tawes Garden isn't likely to ever have a major scientific role in ArbNet—although who knows?—its wide range of member benefits make it an excellent resource and a good partner to have.






Looking Ahead, and Afar
